Ouch, doesn't sound like a lot of fun. Three things I can say that might be useful.

1. You can always switch the way you hold the pick to the 'thumb presses pick into first knuckle on index finger which is curled underneath' technique. Think Vernon Reid. I tried to play like that on purpose at one point but eventually went back to my normal picking. You wind up using a lot more motion at the elbow than the wrist of fingers but once you're used to it in some ways I think it's more exact than the way most people (including me) hold a pick.
