>I wasn't actually talking about Walmart or 7-11....I was asking a serious
question, not
taking a swipe at Apple's distribution. There are plenty of online
retailers in general - I was just curious about brick and mortar
since it's rather difficult to test drive anything other than music and
video online. I also don't really care how many
stores Dell has. I've never bought one, owned one or shopped for one.

Maybe it is different in your state, but CompUSA is the only store here in
Colorado Springs that carries Macs, and it is a separate section. Best Buy
does not, Circuit City does not, Staples doesn't, OfficeMax and Office Depot
don't, and we don't have an Apple Store (there is one in Denver, but that's
the closest). That's one place to go and try before you buy, if that
matters to new customers.

There is no Apple product specialist on hand - just a CompUSA staff kid,
same as every other department. It must be quite expensive to staff a store

with an Apple rep - probably one reason the case and OS cost so much more.
;-) (the cases are quite nice).

And fwiw, nothing survives Best Buy, so I don't know if distribution there is good or bad in reality...not a model store for support or quality sales - it's just big and that's about it. Nothing stops people from locking up comps except the store/staff logins, which many are using now to require users to get an employee to demo the comp for them - that's true for Mac or PC.

But also fyi, Apple didn't become a second class product unless Apple allowed it be viewed that way, nor is it somehow a superior, elitist "experience" by allowing certain stores to carry them only if they setup a separate section for their products. It's just a PC (personal computer) with a different wrapper, but of course, the best snow falls from marketing departments.....

I received my Adam A7's just over a week ago. Spec page shows flat from 46hz to 35khz so I don't know what's happening below. I mix without a sub but you are right, when I turn on my sub I can hear and feel the freq's below and is important to know that they are there especially with heavy kick or keyboard bass patches. I went from NS-10's to A7's.

The A7's definitely are smoother, more precise and warmer. The cabinet is deeper and ported. I also was recommended to just up the pwr to 200w to push the NS10's and they would come alive. I had been using the Alesis RA-100. I recently have seen new Alesis pwr amps with 200 or 250w which I considered primarily because of how quiet and cool they were in my simple home single room studio, but I didn't have much info on them.

Since I only run a single output audio for monitoring and mixing (stereo only) from the MEC s/pdif to my DAC1 and balanced cable to the A7's, I also chose this powered monitor due to the power switch and volume knob on the front. When tracking, I use the DAC1 headphone jacks and turn off the A7s'. The DAC is set to variable so that the DAC volume control controls both headphone and monitor levels.

So considering where I came from and after a week of mixing I'd say this about the A7's . . . they translate better than my previous setup and are less fatiguing.

btw - I posted an ADAT card for sale on the FS site for those interested.

(<http://www.euphonix.com/post/products/mc/mc.htm>), and sold
for under \$5k or so.

The MC runs about \$18k I believe, but has a dedicated protocol (Eucon) for
Nuendo, ProTools, etc.
Using USB midi would be fine, though if you want to go high end, ethernet is
worth a look.

Understanding that the above is probably a little unrealistic, to your list
I would add a jog/shuttle wheel
and assignable keys if possible. I assume you are aiming for a generic midi
DAW controller rather than proprietary
to one DAW.
