For 3,000 people a day, at a guess, for a mostly text site with a touch of graphics, I'd say \$2000 would be minimum to get you at least one machine setup and running doing the job, with maybe 1-2 hours UPS backup.

I'm saying that as my best guess though. Truth is my setup is very minimalist. It doesn't take much grunt to keep this particular show on the road due to

relatively low readership and an almost exclusively text based content.
