dbGNU/Linux distros have to make some choices about how they deal with proprietary drivers. Some of the more strict ones (most notably, Debian itself) simply makes you figure it out yourself. Some (SuSE, Mandrivia) kind of nod and wink and give helpful suggestions or offer to install drivers for you. Ubuntu actually has the drivers packaged and ready to go, just tick a box in the right control panel and you're off using the nVidia or ATI binaries.

In an ideal world the video card companies would publish specs and not enforce NDAs on free software developers, that's what Intel and most of the mobo manufacturers do, as well as pretty much all of the hardware vendors in the enterprise space. For now, Ubuntu is the best option if you don't want to learn how to manage stuff like this on your own.

It's a big step, imho.

Besides getting my system up to speed, I'm wondering if I should consider moving into the 20th century and getting a new platform that is still being supported.

My needs are simple enough. It is strictly for my own personal use and I don't need a ton of tracks (32 is fine). I also don't do anything with MIDI and don't really care to. I would like to be able to use UAD plugins without latency issues and have a machine that is easy to use.

I've been out of it for years, but I do scan the newsgroup from time to time and it sounds like people have left Paris completely or are using it in some peripherhal capacity.

I followed the instructions from the parisfaqs.com website when I did the original install but it doesn't really give instructions on which configuration to use. Also, it seems like I can build a mix, but then when I reopen the file it has problems.

Anyway, any insight on any of the above issues would be greatly appreciated. I like the sound Paris makes so I'm not dissatisfied there. Also, could you include the latest prices on any of the new proposed software. Currently, I'm running a P2.4 with 1gb of ram.

3. Low latency monitoring is possible, thought the more money you throw at it, the more "possible" it really is in a practical way.

4. The ability to use higher sample rates is no big deal to me. I did it for a while. I really don't use them much any more.

5. I'm discovering that Paris was easier to use and sounded better with fewer options. Yeah, bus compression is nice, but what bus compression gets you in native, Paris gets you without needing bus compression and if you do need bus compression in Paris, you can bounce down to a stereo pair and compress the tracks (a type of parallel compression). No matter how much I try to like RME Totalmix, it's just cumbersome and sucks. Creamware was much better as far as I/O interface is concerned on a native platform.

6. VSTi drums will never make me happy....no matter what....never in a million years.

7. The deal killer for me with Paris was lack of delay compensation, but I have added enough outboard crap to my rig by now that I could probably lose the UAD-1 stuff that I like so much and have invested a fortune in. Analog hardware, Paris DSP and low latency VST plugs would likely float my boat now that I have had a healthy dose of "the other side". I would keep a 2nd comp on the side to stream VSTi's in real time, recording them as audio and I'd probably be just as happy....of course, then I lose recall (sigh)

There really is no perfect world these days for what I want to do.....I guess there really never has been, has there?

>So, how did humans get "saved" before Jesus? We've been around for 40 or 50 or even 60 thousand years now and we have a fair amount of documentable history from the last 10 or 15 thousand. Who "saved" Lord Krishna? Who saved the Buddha? Did they and all their followers go to Hell because Jesus hadn't been born yet? I'm asking a serious question here - one that I don't think your bible can answer. I once asked a born again Christian friend what would happen to a Buddhist who had led a perfect Buddhist life - one of kindness and service to his (or her) fellow man, a life without fault - who had never been exposed to the Word of God as taught by Jesus the Christ? Would he go to Heaven or Hell? My friend replied that in order to enter the Kingdom of Heaven he would have to accept Jesus as his Lord and Saviour. I don't buy that. God has existed forever. Jesus existed 2000 years ago. God has never changed. Only our perceptions have changed. I maintain that the Perfect Buddhist would have gone where we all go - back to God. Call it Heaven if you like. We all go back there. There is no other place to go.

I've never read the New Testament. Maybe someday I will. I have, however read much of the Torah, which is what we Jews call the Old Testament. I don't much agree with the parts that discuss who and how we can own other people as slaves or how much I can sell my daughter for or why I should stone someone to death who does work on the Sabbath. The Torah is allegedly the Word Of God too, isn't it? Jesus was a Jew. What do you suppose he believed?

I've read a bit about the history of the Old Testament. It's interesting to see how and when the stories were organized into the form we now know it. It's also interesting to read the theories about who wrote the stories and what their social/political reasons might have been. Why would the writing of the New Testament be significantly different? And why should I accept any of these writings as the literal, pure and true Word Of God? You can argue faith and I accept that. Can you accept that my faith in God doesn't need a saviour named Jesus? Don't know of a Dolby "A" plugin - the only thing I can think of that you might try is a de-noiser plugin of some type, but I have a feeling that might not quite cut it, since you're not really properly decoding the signal (the encoding of which involves some compression & expansion, as well as the noise reduction).

You could try a demo of either of these & see if they'll help:

Really, though, the best way would be to get the original tape & have it dubbed into wav files, with the proper decoding, as I'm sure you know. Make sure you dub duplicates of any vocal tracks WITHOUT the decoding, too, though... that was a popular trick back in the day - playing back vocal tracks without the "A" decoding (or mixing the decoded signal in with the clean, decoded signal); can impart the vocal with some rasp, or "air" or a combination thereof, depending on the singer, how hot the vocal tracks hit the tape, etc.

Can you get the tape? Could the client afford a little bit more budget to get it properly dubbed off? It might be tough finding a studio with a pure "A" system on their 2-inch, but IIRC, Dolby SR can also decode "A", and that's not too hard to find in studios that still have tape... in fact, I can help you there if the client's willing to ship the tape(s) & pay a little bit for the dubbing.

An increase in extreme weather events is predicted by climate scientists as a consequence of the current climate change event.

It may seem counter-intuitive until you really think about it.

Warmer ocean water, more evaporation, more energy in weather systems to carry the moisture farther, this can bring more snow over the mountains.

(And again, any single weather event can't be linked to the current climate change by itself. But over time we can measure patterns.)

Another recent study shows the possibility for earlier rain and earlier snow pack melting leading to quicker snow pack degradation. So even though individual weather systems may dump a lot of moisture (hang in there, Dee!), it may not stay around as long or melt as slowly. Which means we may be facing possible water shortages in some areas.

I haven't seen that idea proposed in any serious mitigation plan. :^)

Nor I. There are always exaggerations. But if you avoid some of the more hyperbolic special interest groups and stick closely to the science, the more likely range of possible outcomes is worth paying attention to and working to mitigate.

> I also don't think we're doing the world any good though by the amount of carbon we pump into the air.

It might be good for some places where a warmer climate is at least a superficial improvement, but bad overall for the possible shock of rapid ecosystem change, threats to coastlines and hard to predict outcomes like the possible melting of permafrost (which would release methane, another greenhouse gas), changing of ocean currents and other rolls of the dice.

> Hopefully, we still have enough time  
> to figure out a clean way to produce the energy we need to maintain our current and growing rate of consumption. I just don't see us all getting around on horses, plowing our fields with oxen, and reading by candlelight anytime soon.

I don't know that horses are all that great of a solution, although I like horses. :^)

But we have a lot of options. There are a lot of efficiency improvements we can make in building design, city planning and manufacturing; logistical improvements to transportation; more efficient uses of fossil fuels; increased use of renewable energy; and faster adoption of more efficient technologies.

With a long lifetime in the atmosphere, the gases stay around and we keep adding to them. And so we are able to have an effect on the average global temperature over time.
