You'll be looking at I'd think at least 1/2 of that, plus whatever delay is introduced in the A to D process. Gotta say, I think you'll be in phase hell trying this. It can be corrected after the fact, but playing live will have issues unless you delay using real time plugs on the other drums tracks in Steiny. Sounds like a giant headache to me dude.

I think 1.5 ms is a round trip analog in analog out, in your case Neil it is halfway so it is half 1.5ms plus some samples)around 7-8 samples the most for the Paris adat transfer.
Also around 20 samples for the ad conversion to adat.
So you will be around 1 ms I guess...
If I were you I would not hesitate letting the drummer hear the toms in his cans , he can hear loud OH where tom also appear.
Drummers like to hear kick and snare the most.
