Then use a sinustone generator with exactly the same hertz as used as playback to record with and use the recording trimpots to get 0db on each of the channels. So, I think that will do the job perfect for you.

.....you still have hair?They do sound nice, don't they? Funny, the C460B's got a bad rap years ago because some of the units exhibited distortion in the head amp and required a mod to fix it. Jim Williams does a pretty well known mod to these mics that is supposed to help them along. I never heard a problem with mine (purchased in 1997) and I like whatever it is that the circuitry imparts to a source, though it may be that there is a little harmonic distortion.....it doesn't seem to impart anything nasty, at least with the units I have here. The C460B's were discontinued.. The newer incarnation is the C480. The capsule is a cardioid capsule labelled CK1.
