I tried tracking down the Taylor, hoping to find it, and at the same time dreading the \$1500 or so it would cost.

I checked the local guitar shop and there was a used but still pristine Ibanez with built in tuner and eq for \$150 + tax.

Not a Taylor. But it will do the job. I'm getting used to it.

With some piddling around, I can get it to sound ok amp'd, and it's ok acoustic. The more I play it, the better I like it.
