above it gets replaced. not sure how it works in paris though.I run Drumagog in Paris on a Mac w/
OS 9.2.2. It works fine for the most
part but I believe us Paris/Mac users are stuck in an older version. The
newest version of Drumagog only runs in OS X. If you're looking to replace
kicks, snares and occasionally toms it works pretty well. One caveat - the
times I've needed it the most have been with the kind of drummers who get
the kinds of sounds with which Drumagog works the worst - soft, indistinct
kicks and snares with a lot of noise-to-signal. It works great with a good
drummer but, of course, that's when you need it the least!

Definitely... a question I used to get a lot is "what is your system and what are your system settings?"

If you can set up a repository for say, Athlon/Intel /by speed /CPU core type/RAM amount/OS type, etc as a searchable database, this might bail someone outta hot water if they can DL a known good config file for a simliar system. Since it's txt, it should take next to no room on your server, and it would be a great resource for checking syntax (stuff like MidiPlay=Disable) in the config file when troubleshooting gets frustrating.
