I have a laptop using and RME multiface for composition stuff. Setup Acid for loops running through Rewire into Cubase. Been really stable so far.

As far as brands of laptops go my experience is with the Dells and toshibas. Placed over 100 Dell laptops (mostly latitudes) and they have been EXTREMELY reliable. I've personally had three toshibas in a row and have been pleasantly surprised with their reliability/ performance. Macs are noe an option because you would have the best of both worlds.
