So, what you believe does not need to be actually true (as in  
reflecting reality) but can be true for you alone? Your reality?

This, of course, begs the question of the existence of God, since

your system does not allow for objectivity. You define the "god" that you need, correct?

Christians believe in an objective creator and absolute morality. We do not know all of it, and we certainly don't live up to it very often, but we aspire to it because we believe it to be \*real\*. It is a truth claim.

Reality is that which makes universal claims to truth, not a unique set of views that works for one person only. I believe in a perfect and objective reality that I aspire to understand some day. I firmly believe that there is all the evidence I need to understand my role in life and what the future holds for me however.

Whenever, I get this error, I remove the last take/edit from the playing

(between the dialogs popping up), save, quite and restart paris.

At this point, the problem seems to go away.
